DISCHARGE INSTRUCTIONS FOR ADULT CIRCUMCISION

After the Surgery

- A small amount of swelling and redness is normal after a circumcision. Bruising of the penis is not uncommon. In time, the discoloration will go away.
- During the first 48 hours, covered ice packs can be placed over the penis for <u>15 minutes every hour</u> as needed to relieve pain and swelling.
- Wear loose fitting underclothing to prevent friction against the penis.
- In the first few days after surgery, a yellow-white film may develop on the head of the penis. This is <u>not</u> a sign of infection. **Do not forcibly remove**. As the healing progresses, this will disappear.
- Expect some redness around the sutures. The sutures around the penis will gradually dissolve.

Dressing

- Keep the initial dressing clean and dry after surgery.
- You may remove the dressing in two to three days.
- Be sure to soak the dressing well, (shower) and then gently remove.

Hygiene

- Sponge-bath only for 4 days following your surgery. Tub bathing should be avoided until sutures have dissolved and the wound is healed.
- Be careful not to swipe the incision with a washcloth or towel, and don't use any scented soaps or gels for several weeks. Pat the area dry to reduce sensitivity.
- After 4 days, you may shower. This will also assist with removing the dressing. (be sure to soak dressing well)

Diet

- Unless otherwise instructed, you may resume your regular diet. If you have nausea, consume only clear fluids and light meals until it passes.
- · A diet high in protein will promote healing.

Activity

- During the first few days following surgery, you should restrict activity, avoid lifting any heavy objects (greater than 15 pounds) and avoid strenuous exercise.
- Resume activity after a few days, and your doctor will advise you when you can return to work.

Medications

- Resume your regular medications unless otherwise instructed.
- The doctor may prescribe pain medication for discomfort, take as directed, do not take additional Tylenol with it.
- If the pain is low, and you do not need the narcotic, you may take over the counter Acetaminophen (Tylenol) or Ibuprofen (Advil, Motrin.)

Sexual Activity

- To reduce nighttime erections pulling on the stitches or bleeding during the first few days, empty your bladder before retiring and a few times during the night.
- You may resume sexual intercourse after sufficient healing time. Speak to your physician if unsure.

If you have been given anesthesia or sedation

- Do not drive or operate machinery for 24 hours.
- Do not make important decisions or sign any important documents in the next 24 hours. Do not plan any activities that require complex thought or coordination for 24 hours.
- Do not consume alcohol, tranquilizers or sleeping medications for the next 24 hours.
- Sedative and narcotic medicines given during a surgical procedure may linger for hours. You may feel dizzy for several hours afterwards.
- You must have a responsible adult with you tonight at home.

Notify your doctor or go to an Emergency Department if any of the following occur:

- Excessive pain not relieved by medications, or a sudden increase of pain.
- Persistent nausea or vomiting not relieved by over-thecounter medications.
- Unable to pass urine.
- Abnormal redness, or drainage of pus from incision.
- Bleeding from the incision.
- Severe swelling of the incision area or penis.
- Fever (over 38°C or 100°F) and/or chills
